MINUTES AND PROCEEDINGS OF A REGULAR MEETING COUNCIL**

The eleventh meeting of Council was called to order by Council President Moran followed by the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag and Invocation.

Approval of Minutes

Motion by Mr. Malta, seconded by Mr. Vanni, to approve the minutes of Regular Meeting of Council of May 18, 2010. Discussion: None. Vote: All ayes. Motion carried.

Reports & Communications from the Mayor/Safety Director

Mayor Bonde reported the Lake County Business Journal would like to publish a story on the Storefront Renovation Program and the grant application for pole sign removal. City has been citing for grass cutting and debris removal. Mayor authorized the Service Department to clean up a home on Mildred that has cars, a camper and very long grass. Pools and parks are near ready for summer. Pools are being filled today, Dudley pool paint is bubbling, city will eventually need to sandblast the pools and repaint. City is slightly behind this year in preparing for summer, last year the city had the assistance of the stimulus workers.

Discussion of Mayor's Report: Mr. Wells asked for an update on the outstanding Storefront Renovation project. Mayor Bonde responded the owner of the building has approved plans to turn the building back into individual stores, work should begin soon. Mr. Salesky inquired as to who would be responsible for the removal of the debris on Mildred. Mayor Bonde responded the city would incur the initial costs and would then be assessed to property taxes. Mr. Malta requested the address of the home; Mayor responded he would provide it after the meeting.

General Communications & Reports – Directors & Officials

Service Director Joe Dominick –written report submitted, reviewed Mildred Street home issues, attempting to locate family members, as the owners of the home are deceased.

Discussion: Mr. Salesky asked if there were anything the city could do with the rusted fence at Manry, as it appears to have had barbed wire on it at one time. Mayor explained the issues regarding the fence. Stated over the years, trees have begun to grow directly into the fencing. Hoped to someday remove and replace fence.

Recreation Director Julie Kless was not present this evening.

Discussion: None.

City Engineer Craig Juday written report submitted.

Discussion: Mr. Wells asked for an update on Thomas Street. Mr. Juday responded the south lane of Thomas has been poured and curb grading of the north lane has begun. Mayor stated the north lane appears to be very muddy due to the rains, asked if there were something that could be placed down to prevent further issues with more rain. Mr. Juday responded the lane must dry before the new concrete can be poured. Mr. Malta thanked Mr. Juday for reviewing the Thomas Street tapes regarding water flow.

Finance Director Cheryl Benedict no written report.

Discussion: None.

Law Director John O'Donnell no written report, explained the 2 ordinances on the agenda.

Discussion: Mayor Bonde stated he would be speaking to the manager of the Shoregate Shopping Center as they have given permission for the Planet Aid collection boxes to be placed back at the Shopping Center. Law Director O'Donnell stated he believes there is an appeal for the Board of Zoning Appeals. Mr. Vanni asked if Mr. Dominick could look into a large truck

parked in the lot of the North Shore Mall. Law Director O'Donnell stated if it belongs to Unique Thrift, it is permitted to park in the lot.

Police Chief Michael Lazor –written report submitted. Explained and reviewed two items on the agenda and asked for approval of them. Mentioned that Officer Prochazka's father was killed in the line of duty when he was 9 years old. Officer Prochazka was recently on Channel 5 news as the individuals are eligible for parole and there is an attempt to prevent their release. Very proud of the interview he gave. Officer Prochazka while on routine patrol, recently located a man in a parked vehicle that was contemplating suicide he was able assist him in getting help he needed. Updated Council on the COPS Grant application. Reminded Council that the grant would cover 100% of an officers salary and benefits for three years but mandates the city keep the officer for a fourth year. Made Council aware that in 2011, there will be 2-3 officers retiring and the assessment process for new hires will need to begin this year. In order for testing to be done the end of this year or early next year, meaning the money would need to be appropriated this year. Chief Lazor stated he would provide a written report regarding the above.

Discussion: None.

Fire Chief Robert Posipanka – Asst. Fire Chief Joe Rupena: written report submitted added the department would be at the St. Mary Magdalene Festival this weekend. Explained the department has been responding to calls on Route 2 eastbound as far as 306 for Willoughby and Eastlake due to the closure of entrances with the construction. These calls will run approximately 2-3 weeks or until the entrance ramps reopen in Willoughby and Eastlake.

Discussion: None.

Chief Building Inspector Joe Dominick submitted written report. The department is keeping up with inspections, stated if problems arise to contact him.

Discussion: Mr. Wells stated he spoke with the County Engineer and the State regarding the constant leaking under the E. 305 and Route 2 bridge. Stated the engineer believes it may be coming up from the ground. There is still some question as to who is actually responsible for repairs of the area. Mr. Wells stated he would keep in contact with them for updates. Asked that North Marginal be graded to alleviate the puddles. Mayor Bonde stated North Marginal is slated for an overlay this year. Mr. Malta asked if there were an order in which the road repairs would occur. Mayor Bonde responded he sent a letter to all the residents on those streets. Mr. Juday stated they are still working on the order of construction. Mr. Dominick added E. 322nd would definitely be the last street done, as it needs the most work.

PUBLIC PARTICIPATION

Tim Sherman of Glen Arden Drive serves as Vice President of the Willowick Soccer. Asked about the failed vote from last meeting regarding fencing around Roosevelt. Stated the fence is a safety issue and coaches do their very best to keep the children from running into the street. Reminded Council the soccer league was moved from the area behind Shoregate Shopping Center when it was sold for housing. Stated the league has thoughts on what they would like to do in the future and thought the fencing was a city issue since the funds are in the levy account.

There are currently 523 children in the soccer league at this time. Asked that Council reconsider their vote for the fence.

Rich Hill of E. 323rd Street stated he is a soccer coach and has children that play in the league. Explained that not only are there the players at the park, but also friends, siblings, family, people living in the neighborhood and dog walkers. Parking is very limited and most participant's park at St. Mary Magdalene Church, which is another safety issue. Asked, for the record, how each Councilmember voted and the reasons for their votes. Why Council thought it was not a city safety issue.

Donna Lauderback 410 E. 288th Street, currently serves on the Recreation Board as Treasurer for the soccer league. Feels Council needs to reconsider their vote regarding the fence. Out of 39 teams, approximately 35 teams play at Roosevelt 5 to 6 days a week. Willowick is a young community and many other younger siblings come along with the players, the league is very concerned with crossing at Vine Street, as cars drive fast down the street, would hate to see an accident. The soccer league is the only league that has to provide their own port a potties, as the city only provides one. With a league as big as it is, hoped the city would help the league out a little more. A U-4 (3-4 year olds) league has just begun as well. Asked Council to reconsider their vote on the fence.

(Woman's voice, inaudible name and address) respectfully requests Councils reasoning for no votes regarding the fence. Did research, according to the 2000 Census, the city had roughly 3,044 children under the age of 18. The league has 523 children participating in soccer, which is roughly 20% of those children under 18. Cannot imagine a capital project that would touch as many lives of the Willowick children that this fence would. Asked Council to reconsider their no votes.

Joseph Dever of 276 E. 329th Street is publicist for the Soccer League. Stated he went to all the neighbors that live in the area as the league has many ideas of what they would like to do at the Roosevelt Park. Out of approximately the 40 residents that live directly across, the number one concern was having a fence put up and the second concern was the flagpole is not lit. The residents realize the children dart into the street and run between the cars.

Roger (last name inaudible) of E. 324th Street lives across the street supports the soccer league. Explained the large number of cars parked in the street as well as the safety of the children. If there cannot be a fence, perhaps traffic control could be managed better. \$11,000 for a child's life is senseless, added it is indeed a madhouse with all the cars coming and going.

Keith Parker of 305 E. 330th Street is a coach, explained when he began coaching, the children played at Dudley; the main concern is balls going into the street. Pointed out that every other park in the city has a fence and would like to see a fence around Roosevelt.

Mr. Hill spoke again that his family not only uses the park during soccer season, but all year as well. Noted that the park is used by so many people for all recreational activities. There is not a time during the summer that there is not a lot of activity going on.

Response to Public Participation

Council President Moran was the first to respond, speaking for herself and at least some of the Council members, explained when the park was first designed, it was to be a passive park. There was no plan for soccer or swing sets and T-ball was to stay temporarily. The park was never intended to be used for what it has become today. Part of the no vote came from the fact it was to be a passive park and part of the no vote was whether the city would be able to spend \$11,000. Ms. Moran stated she does not want to see a chain link fence that would require a lot of maintenance as well as making the area look like a compound. It is a big open area that was to be trees and benches. Agrees perhaps it should be looked at again. Added she had asked a couple of years ago that there not be parking on the street because it is dangerous. Does not feel a fence will help children from running between the cars. Feels it needs to be handled with the league and parents need to be told at the beginning of the soccer season that there is not to be parking along the streets, only parking at St. Mary Magdalene Church. Cannot condone placing a Police Officer at the park to monitor parking. Opened the floor to the remainder of Council. Mr. Allan stated he was a no vote and that the park was meant to be a passive park. Stated he also lives at the end of the street and drives it daily, noted how slowly you must drive down the street. Explained the current chain link fences throughout the city, many of which are currently in need of repairs or replacement. Would rather see something more appealing around Roosevelt. Council wasn't approached about the fence prior to the no vote. Ms. Moran asked what month's soccer is actively playing. A gentleman responded practice begins for spring March (weather permitting) and September for fall league. The fall league runs August to October. Spring runs March to June. Ms. Moran stated she has been made aware of the other ideas for the park such as a concession stand and bathroom facility asked that if this is indeed what the soccer league has in mind, they begin communicating with Council and the city regarding their ideas. Reiterated that this park was meant to be a passive park only and not intended for its current use. Ms. Moran is not opposed whatsoever with revisiting the fence issue. Asked that there be perhaps ideas and options brought to Council for discussion. It is Ms. Moran's opinion that if the city were to spend the \$11,000., perhaps the soccer league would be willing to contribute funds to accommodate an upgrade to a nicer, more appealing fence. Mr. Malta thanked the soccer league for coming out tonight, added he too was a no vote. Mr. Malta pointed out that he is a very big supporter of the recreation department and has sponsored teams; he would not be opposed to reconsidering the fence issue in the future, asked for more information, adding the park is beautiful, one of the nicest pieces of property in the city. His concern is that it needs to be maintained. Mr. Vanni stated he was a yes vote, lives on the street but does not drive down the street due to all the traffic and children running everywhere. It is his opinion that the main reason the fence did not pass is due to it being a chain link, in that area, it should have something a little nicer. Agrees that something needs to be done, feels the league and city need to work together toward something both parties can agree on. Mr. Salesky stated he was a no vote because it his feeling that the soccer organization should possibly put forth some funding toward the fencing. Explained the amount of time Council has spent going over the budget, making cuts and possibly lay-offs. His no vote had more to do with budgetary cuts and lay-offs than chain link vs. wrought iron. Suggested the possibility of stronger fundraisers to raise more money and possibly purchase the fence or good faith effort to donate some financial assistance. Mr. Wells stated he too was a no vote, stressed that he has always supported recreational improvements, however, there is a very real possibility that the children would jump a 4' fence to retrieve a ball, felt the players need to be instructed on what to do should a ball roll off the field. Reiterated Council President Moran's statement that this park was meant to be a passive park and not a soccer field. Commended the Soccer League for the great job they have done with the program but feels the league should look elsewhere in the city for more suitable land. Mayor Bonde commented he is in favor of the fence for safety reasons and does not believe the Soccer League is responsible for

any of the fencing costs. The city would never ask the baseball league to pay for a backstop or the swim team to purchase a lifeguard chair, stated these are safety issues the city must fund. Luxury items, such as lights would be something the soccer leagues would be responsible for. The problem is the programs size and continual growth, causing many games to go into the evenings, which is the reasoning for the possible installation of lighting. Mayor explained though he is not in favor of chain link, a more decorative fence would be too expensive. Explained the fencing would prohibit the children from running into the street. Would like to meet Recreation Director Kless and the soccer league board to discuss further prohibiting cars from parking on the street. Is looking into several parking solutions. Mr. Salesky addressed the Mayor that it appears Roosevelt is going to become a soccer compound as there as been made mention the addition of lights, restrooms and concessions. A soccer parent clarified that soccer practices and plays for approximately a little over 4 months. Ms. Moran stressed that residents complained when the old school was still standing, once the school was torn down, the area became a very nice green space for residents to enjoy. Stated a flagpole was installed, and bleachers were installed once soccer began playing on the field due to parents having nowhere to sit, a small playground was than installed for the little ones to play on. Asked that if the intention is to make this park a soccer compound to simply state it. Commended the Soccer League for being so successful, however, if a 3rd park is built in the city of this size, it is one more park for the Service Department to maintain and they are stretched to their limit now. Mayor stated the city is already maintaining the land. Ms.Moran stated if there were to be an addition of lights, concessions, additional bleachers, restrooms and possible fence issues, the parks department may not be able to handle. Is worried whether the city can handle these issues at this time. Ms. Moran opened the floor for comments.

Mr. Sherman commented on Mr. Salesky's statement regarding being accountable to money spent to his constituents, stating these funds are from a levy fund and not coming out of the general budget, the funds are there. After the fencing would be put up, there would be approximately \$20,000 remaining in the recreation levy account. He understands the maintenance of the park but something needs to be done to prevent children from running into the street. Explained there is nowhere left for the league to go. They had been playing in the space next to Shoregate Shopping Center, which has since become a housing development. There is not room at Manry or Dudley due to baseball, softball and football. Fully understands the city's desire to maintain a green space. Stresses the need to keep the children safe and out of the street and the addition of lights, concessions and restrooms are no more than what Manry and Dudley already have and are being maintained. Lights would only be lit when absolutely necessary toward the end of the evening games. Stated while he appreciates what the baseball league has donated to the city leagues, they are only cosmetics, not for the safety of the players. Ms.Moran stated she does not disagree with the safety issues, but if this park is headed toward becoming a soccer compound, it needs to be stated and Council needs to find a way to make it work because at this time, there is not money for these things. Understands there are many participants, but the city has less than 15,000 people in the city, and to put in a 3rd park for an overall small percentage of residents that use it. Does not feel in a city as recreation heavy as Willowick, it is not known whether the city can afford another park. Stressed it is not about which league puts more money into the city parks. If a league has extra money to put into the parks, that is one thing but if lights are installed, someone has to pay the light bill, which would fall onto the city, the same with restrooms and security. Council President Moran stated she understands at this time the only issue is the fencing, but Council must also look at the big picture of where the league may be headed. Explained the responsibility Council has to look into the budget and finances of the city and make good choices when approving expenditures.

Council always welcomes comments and suggestions, but asked that in the future the soccer league could be more open with their plans.

Donna Lauderback stated the soccer league isn't asking for anything the other leagues don't already have, they're not asking for a compound, just the same space allotment that baseball, softball and football get. Soccer needs a place to play their games and keep their children safe. Stressed all the other improvements are far down the road and the only need of immediate attention is the fencing issue. Ms. Moran stated Council is asking if the league has more improvements in mind, they make Council aware of their ideas. Ms. Lauderback is in total agreement that the league and Council should sit down together to discuss a plan of where the league is headed. Both Ms. Lauderback and Council President Moran agree that there needs to be some communication between the soccer league and Council.

Mr. Sherman asked if there were a levy passed a few years ago for capital improvements throughout the city where this money would be coming from rather than the general fund budget. Asked if the money is for something else or if it were just sitting there for recreation and parks as this fence is for recreation and parks.

Council President Moran deferred response to Finance Director Benedict who explained that the recreation levy generates approximately \$66,000 per year, which is used to maintain all of the parks, pools and incidentals, which is not a lot of money. The painting of the pool would come from this fund in an attempt to protect the General Fund. Explained the city has paid off the pavilion this year leaving very limited funds for the remainder of the year. Explained the money needs to go for repairs and replacements of any of the fences at all the parks, the painting of the pools any parks and recreation improvements and repairs would come from this fund.

Mr. Sherman asked for a ballpark figure of the balance in the account. Asked if money were available in the account to pay for a fence. Finance Director Benedict stated there probably was enough money to pay for the fence but not funding for much else. Asked if using the money would raise anyone's taxes or jeopardize the job of an employee by spending this money. Finance Director Benedict explained it would not come from the General Fund budget it would come from the levy and would deplete most of that fund for this year, which means going into next year with a near zero balance until the first half property tax came through. Explained any improvements next year would need to be put off until the first half taxes were received or there would need to be a transfer from the General Fund, which the city would like to avoid if at all possible. Mayor Bode explained why the funds are so low in the levy fund and the amount collected is the same as 25 years ago, added that eventually the city would need to renew or replace this levy. Ms. Moran opened the floor up to Council at this time.

Mr. Allan states Council does not disagree that the safety of the children is a priority. Feels the city needs to obtain more information from the league in order to make a decision based on what the league's future plans are. Stated that one solution would be to look out side of the city for another practice/playing field. In his past basketball coaching experience, if there was not gym time available within the city, he had contacted surrounding cities to rent or borrow their facilities for the league use. Mr. Allan stressed he is not saying the children should join the soccer leagues of other cities, but have the Willowick Soccer League contact other cities for field time. Another suggestion would be to look within the city for more open spaces and contact the property owners as well. Further discussion between Mr. Allan and several audience members occurred, but is inaudible due to multiple people speaking at once. Mr. Malta added that every Director and Chief went through their respective budgets to make cuts and commended the job

they have done, feels that Council needs more information before making a large expenditure at this time. Understands fully this is a safety issue.

Ms. Moran opened the floor for a statement portion only. Made clear that Council makes their decisions in the best interest of the city as a whole, that Council makes expenditures carefully as they would with their own budgets. Understands that to the league it is a fence for safety, to Council, it is a fence for safety but also a large expenditure that will affect the finances of the city. Mentioned that Council had discussed prohibiting parking on the street a couple of years ago and are very aware of the parking and congestion in the park area. Council will revisit the fence issue, suggested more options and information should be presented to Council as well.

Rich Hill stated that Council keeps saying the park was not intended for a soccer field, but the residents have shown the city there is a strong interest in soccer and it is needed. Ms. Moran stated that while 500+ children in the program is impressive in a city of 14,000+ residents, it is not a majority of the city. Mr. Hill continued that Council has said it is a city park and with it being a city park, they have a responsibility to make sure the area is safe. Went on to state in speaking with the residents that live in the general area, many of them admitted parking in the parking lot frequently and overnight simply because they did not have space in their driveways. Stated that there are residents that want to use it for their own personal use and let their dogs run free from leashes and that is not what it should be used for. He questioned Mr. Allan's comment that the children should go outside the city for soccer. Mr. Allan clarified his statement in that he suggested if there were not open fields within the city, perhaps the league should look outside the city for a practice/playing field. Never stating children should not play in the Willowick Soccer League. Offered several open field locations that the league should look into renting, purchasing or using. A female stated she is empathetic to the budget issues within the city and appreciates the decisions made, she works in nonprofit and has also had to deal with job losses, but is confused hearing Council speak of a \$30,000 versus an \$11,000 fence. A coach/ equipment manager stated the league has talked with the parents numerous times regarding parking on the street and asked if there were a possibility of posting no parking signs with the warning of a parking ticket during posted times. They have tried talking to the parents in small groups as well as putting in writing. Chief Lazor responded that the city can place no parking signs in the area, however, stressed that everyone must understand \$25.00 parking tickets would be issued to the cars parked in the area and that most of the tickets would be those parents having children playing on the field. Stated the possibility of issuing warnings for a short time. Ms. Moran added that maybe this situation could be avoided by stating the no parking rule in the letters going out to the parents. The coaches stated it is placed in the letter and is not effective. An audience member stated that they had talked to Mayor Bonde about the possibility of lights and fencing and several coaches have gone to every house in the general area to speak with them regarding lights. Of the 40 houses visited, they have 36 signatures of those with no problem with lights or fencing. Council President Moran thanked everyone for coming and voicing the opinions and assured them Council will take everything stated into consideration concerning the fence.

Chief Lazor wanted to take an opportunity to thank Council for the approval of the 911 upgrading system.
